on the question of abstention from national daylight saving time. It may be noted that proposals having to do with liquor generally have brought out a high voting level, particularly in recent years.

The constitutional amendment in 1894 to lengthen the term of the superintendent of schools saw only 50.76 percent of the gubernatorial electors voting on the proposal, the lowest level in the state's history.

Fewer than half (44.6%) of all matters referred to the voters have been sustained or approved. The average voting level has been somewhat under eighty percent of the voter turnout for the gubernatorial election. Table 6, relating approval and turnout ratios, indicates a general tendency for approval to be associated with low turnout; note that 24 issues were approved and only six rejected when the turnout ratio was under 70 percent. Conversely, a high turnout most often accompanied popular rejection of a proposal; 49 issues failed while 25 passed when the turnout ratio was above 80 percent. Care must be taken in interpreting such summary remarks. The wording of the proposition may be such that a negative vote will favor adoption of a new policy. To cite a fairly unusual circumstance, in 1968 citizens referred by petition a law passed by the Legislature (pursuant to federal statute) which would have excluded South Dakota from provisions of national daylight saving time. The question before the electorate was whether the state law should be sustained; a "yes" would favor state exclusion, a "no" vote would approve state exclusion and thus favor daylight time. Be that as it may, Table 6 does properly measure the degree to which the electorate approves or rejects legislatively-endorsed constitutional amendments or laws and initiated laws proposed by the populace without legislative action.

Table 7 shows the subjects and results of the elections concerning constitutional amendments and initiated and referred laws in South Dakota since statehood.
